# NORTHWEST ROUNDUP & EXHIBITION OBJECTIVE OF THE SWAN RIVER VALLEY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

# THE OBJECTS OF THE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY ARE FOR THE GOOD OF THE COUNTRY AND OUR PEOPLE TO ORGANIZE AND CONDUCT EXHIBITIONS FOR:

- (a) The promotion of practical and scientific husbandry in all its varying branches.
- (b) The improvements of the types of horses, cattle, sheep, swine, goats and other farm and domestic animals.
- (c) The development of industrial resources of the country.
- (d) The dissemination of mechanical and scientific knowledge.
- (e) The encouragement of the cultivation of the beauty in nature and arts.
- (f) The stimulation of healthy rivalry for supremacy and excellence in the minds of the rising generation.
- (g) The promotion of trade and commerce.

#### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

NOTE: Prizes will be paid Pro rata on the basis of this prize list after the expenses of the fair are paid

#### **FEES**

- 1. All entry fees \$3.00 each unless otherwise stated.
- 2. Entry Fee for Stake Classes are \$10.00 each. The prize money is \$100.00 plus \$60.00 prize money plus \$10.00 entry fee added to stake and divided as follows: 30%, 25%, 20%, 15%, 10%.
- 3. A fee of \$30.00 +G.S.T. (non-electrical), \$50.00 + G.S.T. (Electrical), will be charged to exhibitors who park trailers, campers, mobile homes, etc. on the fairgrounds during the fair. All persons paying this fee will be issued a windshield sticker, which must be displayed on the vehicle.
- 4. All exhibitors are required to pay a \$10.00 administration fee per person.
- 5. Every adult contestant must purchase a \$35.00 bracelet. 12 years and under \$25.00 bracelet. This bracelet permits you to activities on the grounds and admission to all Friday, Saturday and Sunday grandstand performances. This bracelet does not include Arena dances, Thursday Night Grandstand or Midway Rides. Any contestant under the age of 18 may purchase one "*Parent or Guardian*" Helper Pass. Any contestant entering 3 or more horses may purchase 1 helper pass for \$35.00. (6 horses = 2 helper passes) etc. Bracelet must be put on at the administration office.
- 6. Stalls must be cleaned prior to leaving. A \$20.00 refundable stall-cleaning fee must be submitted by separate cheque. Cheque will be returned if stall is cleaned to the satisfaction of the Light Horse Committee
- 7. No Class entry fee shall be refunded except as verified by a veterinarian or doctor. In lieu of refund competitor may choose to substitute their horse up to one hour prior to class. Substitution will count as a new horse/rider combination. Withdrawn horse may not re-enter.
- Entries will be accepted up until July 12<sup>th</sup>,2024. Late entries, changes or substitutions will be accepted after this date until July 19<sup>th</sup>. The penalty for late entries, changes and substitutions is double the entry fee. NO ENTRIES, CHANGES OR SUBSTITUTIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER JULY 19<sup>TH</sup>, 2024
- 9. All entries and entry fees are accepted online, or by email. You are not considered entered unless full payment is made. Your confirmation of your entries will be emailed to you. You will have 24 hours after this email to change or correct entries without penalty.

#### **GENERAL**

- 10. The secretary will not be responsible for errors. Your entry form will be emailed back to you to confirm what you have entered. It is your responsibility to check that this information is correct
- 11. The directors will take every precaution under the circumstances to insure the safety of articles brought to the exhibition and should an article by accident be injured, lost or stolen, they will give all assistance in their power towards recovery of the same, but will not make payment for the value thereof.
- 12. A meeting of the directors will be held (notice of which will be given) to hear and decide complaints or grievances that may arise in awarding prizes. Protests must be made in writing on day of the show and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$20.00, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained
- 13. PRIZE MONEY PAID BY CHEQUE BY MAIL.

- 14. Stabling and accommodations will be at the discretion of the grounds committee and every attempt will be made to provide facilities. Box stalls are limited so horses MUST be able to tie safely in a tie stall.
- 15. In all events where age is stated, contestants will be obliged to furnish proof of age if a dispute on this point should rise.
- 16. LOCAL refers to the RESIDENTS (must reside in) of the Municipality of Swan Valley West and Minions-Bowsman, and the Local Government District of Mountain and all the towns and villages therein. Local refers to horse and handler.
- 17. The wearing of helmets for competitors in Peewee, Mini and Junior classes and practice areas is <u>mandatory</u>. Any competitors or individuals under the age of 18 as of January 1 of the current year must wear approved ASTM/SEI or BSI/BS EN protective headgear in all events and while on the grounds. Any competitor may wear protective headgear in any division or class without penalty from the judge
- 18. No person shall be allowed to use abusive language or to interfere with the judge in the discharge of his or her duties. Exhibitors so interfering will forfeit their rights to any premium to which they might otherwise be entitled
- 19. No visitors to the fair grounds of the Society nor any person or persons, firms or corporation, or their agents, representing any license and /or employees, having, holding, or enjoying any license or privilege to exhibit at any time on the fair grounds of the society or occupying any space thereon for exhibition or any other purpose or purposes, shall have any claim, or right to claim for damages arising from, or as a result of an injury or injuries to any person, or to any persons, or to any property, while on the fair grounds of the society, nor shall any claim or demand in respect thereof be instituted or maintained.
- 20. If any damage, loss or injury to persons shall be caused by reason of any neglect or willful act of any person, firm or corporation, or their agents, representative, servants, or employees, having license or privilege to exhibit on said fairgrounds or occupying space thereon, the Swan River Valley Agricultural Society shall in no manner be responsible thereof and in the case it be subjected to any expense or liabilities, all persons causing or liable thereof shall indemnify the said society.
- 21. Town bylaw 27/87 is followed concerning pets.
  - All dogs and other animals shall if removed from the owner's property, be on a leash or be sufficiently trained that it is under the direct and adequate supervision of the owner or his or her authorized representative. All VEHICLES WITHOUT A VEHICLE PASS WILL BE TOWED AWAY AT OWNERS EXPENSE
- 22. On making entry the owner assumes all liability on account of accidents to either horse or rider or property and releases the Swan River Valley Agricultural Society from all responsibility.
- 23. Any horse not entered in the prize list is not eligible for a stall
- 24. The show committee reserves the right to test for any medication, drug, or mechanical device administered internally or externally to a horse before or during any event and upon discovery of such, have the right to disqualify that horse from competition
- 25. Coggins Test is not mandatory, though we recommend that each horse be tested.
- 26. NO SOLICITING ON THE GROUNDS

#### **CLASS**

- 27. Where there are less than two exhibitors in a class, this class may be combined with another class
- 28. The judges may recommend exhibit not on the prize list and directors may take the matter into consideration and award diploma or special prize where they think the prize worthy The judges may recommend exhibit not on the prize list and directors may take the matter into consideration and award diploma or special prize where they think the prize worthy
- 29. The judges may recommend exhibit not on the prize list and directors may take the matter into consideration and award diploma or special prize where they think the prize worthy
- 30. In placing animals in the show ring, the judge is instructed to place according to merit regardless of competition.
- 31. All exhibitors in riding classes must provide saddles and bridles.
- 32. All riders, drivers, and attendants, etc. must be neatly and suitable dressed on entering the ring.
- 33. The judge may send any horse from the ring for bad behavior or lameness. Only attendants are allowed in the ring during judging
- 34. In Classes 3, 7, & 8, registration may be required.
- 35. Number system will be used. Numbers must be worn on the back of all contestants while in the ring. If numbers are used on the saddle pad, then there must be numbers on BOTH sides. If they are of a HAND DRAWN nature,

# they must be clear and legible. Numbers allotted to each light horse upon entry. Incorrect numbers or no numbers will be disqualified .

36. No cross entry between pony and horse classes except as noted.

#### **NO PONIES IN HORSE CLASSES**

- 37. Stallions, 2 years and over must be shown by a person 18 years and over.
- 38. Junior drivers under 14 years of age must be accompanied in the carriage by a knowledgeable adult.
- 39. All driving classes will be run by Equine Canada (CEF) Section C Rules except junior age designations. (See Page 3).
- 40. In the Gymkhana events, all hats/helmets must be on your person when you cross the finish line or disqualified. (If hat/helmet hits the ground the rider is disqualified.)
- 41. In the Gymkhana Events a horse may be ridden by only one rider per event. (Barrels, poles, keyhole, ribbon, stake race).
- 42. In Gymkhana events for safety reasons all exhibitors must enter through the **IN** gate and exit through the **OUT** gate or be disqualified.
- 43. In the Gymkhana events, the order of go will be posted. Competitors will have 30 seconds to start the pattern after their names are announced. **NO LEADING OF HORSES/PONIES PAST THE START LINE.**
- 44. Gymkhana participants must enter on the east side of the track and park on the North side of the infield. Signs will be posted. No parking on the track.
- 45. There will be a three-minute time limit from the time the class is called to the closing of the gate. After the gate has closed no one will be allowed in. There will be no exceptions
- 46. Patterns and entries will be posted on a board at the end of show ring. It is the responsibility of the competitor to check their entries prior to the show and advise of any errors

#### STOCK

- 47. Stock must be on the grounds not later than noon on the first day of the show, and by 8am on Saturday and Sunday. No stock will be allowed to compete as purebred unless a proper pedigree is produced or the registration number entered on the form. Every exhibit must be entered in the name of the owner.
- 48. No animal suffering from any infections or contagious disease shall be admitted to the fair grounds.
- 49. Where purebred animals compete with grades, breeding shall not be considered in awarding prize
- 50. All exhibits must be owned by the exhibitor at least thirty days before the fair. No prize will be awarded to any unsound animals. Exhibitors may have advice from judge as to classifying exhibits

After time allotted, presentations are final.

## What is this class all about?

The following are descriptions of the light horse classes to help spectators better understand What the judge is looking for.

Equine Canada rules over-ride any explanation given in this section.

- Halter classes are divided into 2 types: confirmation and showmanship.
- Confirmation This class evaluates the conformation of the horse. Classes are divided by age and sex. Horses are shown on the halter and are traveled before the judge so that lameness and quality of movement can be evaluated. Horses are judged on balance, structural correctness, and breed and sex characteristics. In addition to age and sex divisions, horses may be judged on type and their suitability to a specific application, i.e. saddle type or harness type.
- **Showmanship** This class is designed to judge the showmanship skills of the exhibitor. The judge evaluates the grooming and fitting of the horse and expertise of the exhibitor in presenting the horse. Each exhibitor is required to perform a pattern designed by the judge with emphasis on preciseness of pattern and degree of confidence exhibited by the showman.

**Western classes** are conducted in "Western" tack and attire, which is most commonly associated with riding in North America. Classes are divided into 2 types: equitation and performance.

Gaits – The 3 major gaits in western classes are: Walk, Jog and Lope. Horses must also halt and back up.

- Western Equitation\Stock Seat Eq. — This class is designed to test the horsemanship abilities of riders using western tack. The class may be divided into 2 sections; riders may first follow a prescribed pattern of maneuvers at a walk, trot or lope. Finalists would then ride as a group around the perimeter of the arena. Judging focuses on the rider's body position, seat in the saddle and ability to control the horse.

#### - There are a wide variety of performance classes

- Western Pleasure This is one of the most popular show events. Contestants compete simultaneously, traveling the perimeter of the arena, and at the discretion of the judge, are asked to walk, jog, lope and reverse the direction of the horse. Horses are evaluated on quality of movement while staying quiet and calm, traveling on a loose rein. This horse should be "a pleasure" to ride.
- Western Riding This class judges the abilities of the horse to change leads precisely, easily and simultaneously, using both hind and front legs. Following a designated pattern, consisting of a log and a series of pylons, the horse and rider must change gaits (from walk to a jog or a lope) throughout the course. Reward is given to the horse that changes fluidly and precisely between the middle of the pylons within the pattern. Emphasis is placed on smoothness and an even cadence of gaits. The horse should cross the log both at the jog and the lope without breaking gait or radically changing stride.
- Reining This class judges the horse on movements, mastery of a prescribed maneuver and attitude as he is guided through a pattern. The horse is required to perform a number of stops, spins, rollbacks, lead changes and circles at a lope. The horse should be willing to be guided with little or no resistance. Credit is given for smoothness, finesse, attitude, quickness and authority of performing various maneuvers, while using controlled speed. This raises the difficulty level and makes him more exciting and pleasing to watch.

- **Trail** The trail class tests the maneuverability of a horse through an obstacle course. Mandatory obstacles include one in which the rider will open, pass through and close a gate. Other mandatory obstacles are riding over at least 4 logs or poles and 1 backing obstacle. The judge will assign a point value to each obstacle and points will be added to or subtracted from this score based on the horse's willingness, ease and grace in negotiating the course.
- **-Ranch Riding -** The purpose of Ranch Riding should reflect the versatility, attitude, and movement of a working horse. The horse's performance should simulate a horse working outside the confines of an arena and that of a working ranch horse. This class should show the horse's ability to work at a forward, working speed while under control by the rider. Light contact should be rewarded and horse shall not be shown on a full drape of reins. The overall manners and responsiveness of the horse while performing the manoeuvre requirements and the horse's quality of movement are the primary considerations.

#### Gymkhana \ Western Speed Events Division

- **Barrel Racing** This is an exciting race against the clock in which exhibitors follow a course consisting of 3 barrels in a triangular "cloverleaf" pattern. Riders choose to circle either the right or left barrel first, race to the opposite barrel and complete the course after circling the third barrel and racing down the center of the 3 barrels to stop the timer. Knocking over a barrel carries a 5 second penalty.
- **Pole Bending** This is a timed event in which the speed and agility of the horse are tested as horse and rider twice weave through a course of 6 poles spaced 21 feet apart. From the start line exhibitors ride to the farthest pole and weave the length of the poles and then turn and weave back again. They then turn and race to the finish line. The pattern must be followed exactly. A 5 second penalty is added for each pole knocked down.
- **Keyhole** In this timed event, contestants must travel from the start line to a keyhole shape marked in flour on the ground. Once inside the keyhole the horse must turn or pivot 180° without touching the white lines. Leaving the same way they came in, contestants run to the finish line. If the horse touches or steps over the white line they are disqualified.
- **Ribbon Race** This race requires coordination and cooperation between team members. The horses must be able to travel side by side even in the turns. Two riders are joined together by a rather short paper ribbon that they hold in their hands. From the starting line the competitors travel down the arena to a barrel. They must go around the barrel and return to the finish line. If they release or tear the ribbon they are disqualified. Knocking over a barrel carries a 5 second penalty. Of course, speed is good, but agility is better.
- Stake Race The official obstacle of the stake Race shall be a pole 6' tall mounted on a 10 to 18 inches diameter base. The correct pattern shall be: run across the center timing line, turning left or right around the stake at that end; return through the center, turn the opposite way around the other stake then sprint back through the center shutting off the timer. Failure to follow the course or knocking down a stake or course marker shall result in elimination.

**English classes** are conducted in "English" tack and attire, which is most commonly associated with riding in Britain or Europe. Classes are divided into 2 types: equitation and performance.

Gaits – The 3 major gaits in English classes are: Walk, Trot and Canter. Horses must also halt and back up

- English Equitation – This class tests the ability to ride, not the performance of the horse. As in western equitation, contestants work a predetermined pattern consisting of maneuvers such as changing gaits, traveling in a figure-8 pattern, backing up as well as posting (rising in the saddle) on the correct diagonal and counter-cantering. Riders are usually judged individually and then return to be judged as they travel the perimeter of the arena performing gait changes at the judge's discretion. Emphasis is placed on ability to sit correctly, hold the correct riding posture and control the horse on a precise pattern.

#### - There are a wide variety of performance classes

- **English Pleasure** In this class the judge evaluates a hunter-type horse on the flat, both directions of the arena, at a walk, trot and canter. Emphasis is placed on smoothness of gait, free-flowing stride and willingness to perform.
- Road Hack The road hack is a speedy road horse used under saddle at a flat-footed walk, a trot, road trot, canter and hand gallop. At any time during the class, judges may ask entries to halt and walk off on a loose rein. At the hand gallop, the horse should demonstrate his ability to move out of a rolling three-beat canter by lengthening his stride to a controlled gallop. The resulting increase in speed should be equally consistent on the straightaway and on the turns. Excessive speed shall be penalized. The road hack must stand quietly and back readily.
- Hunter This event includes several divisions based on the configuration and height of the fences. The class demonstrates the gracefulness of the horse as it maneuvers a course consisting of at least 4 obstacles but must jump a minimum of eight fences (some may be jumped twice). Manners, style of jumping, flow of strides, balance and keeping an even hunter pace are factors in the judge's scoring.
- Jumper Jumping is a test of a horse's athletic ability to perform over fences. Jumping consists of at least 4 obstacles and a minimum of 8 jumps (some may be jumped twice). Scores are based on time and penalty faults. Faults are assessed when a horse refuses to jump, knocks down an obstacle or causes the height of an obstacle to be lowered. Horses completing the course without faults return to compete in a timed "jump off" to determine final placing.

**Driving Classes** are divided into 2 types: Pleasure and Reinsmanship. Further division may be made between numbers of horses (singles or pairs).

Gaits – The 4 major gaits in pleasure driving are: walk, slow trot, working trot and strong trot. Horses must also halt and rein back.

- **Walk** A free, regular and unconstrained walk of moderate extension is required. The horses should walk energetically, but calmly, with even and determined pace.
- Slow Trot the horse should maintain forward impulsion while showing submission to the bit. The trot is slower and more collected, but no to the degree required in the dressage collected trot. However, the horse should indicate willingness to be driven on the bit while maintaining a steady cadence.
- Working Trot This is the pace between the strong and the slow trot and more round than the strong trot. The horses go forward freely and straight; engaging the hind legs with good hock action; on a taut, but light, rein; the position being balanced and unconstrained. The steps should be as even as possible. The hind feet touch the ground in the footprints of the fore feet. The degree of energy and impulsion displayed at the working trot denoted clearly the degree of suppleness and balance of the horse.
- **Strong Trot** This is a clear, but not excessive, increase in pace and lengthening of stride while remaining well balanced and showing appropriate lateral flexion on turns. Light contact to be maintained. Excessive speed will be penalized.

- *Halt* Horses and vehicle should be brought to a complete square stop without abruptness or veering. At the halt, horses should stand attentive, motionless and straight with the weight evenly distributed over all 4 legs and be ready to move off at the slightest indication from the driver.
- *Rein Back* Rein back is defined as a backward movement in which the legs are raised and set down simultaneously in diagonal pairs with the hind legs remaining well in line. The horse must move backward at least 4 steps in an unhurried manner with head flexed and straight, pushing the carriage back evenly in a straight line. The driver should use quiet aids and light contact. The horse must then move forward willingly to former position using the same quiet aids.
- **Reinsmanship** This class is the driven equivalent of ridden equitation and entries are judged primarily on the ability and skill of the driver. Shown at a walk, slow trot, working trot and strong trot, drivers shall also be required to rein back. Exhibitors may be asked to work simultaneously or individually. Individual work may include a figure of 8 and/or other appropriate tests.
- **Pleasure Driving** In this class entries are judged primarily on the suitability of the horse to provide a peasant drive. The horse is required to pull a suitable 2 or 4 wheeled vehicle along the perimeter of the arena at a walk, slow trot, working trot and strong trot. The horse is judged on straight and free movement, manners and a bright expression while staying under the driver's control at all times. Horses must not break into a canter at any time. Exhibitors may be asked to do individual work.



## **NAERIC RULES AND REGULATIONS**

#### **GENERAL RULES**

- 1) The NAERIC Advantage® program reserves the right to modify the rules of this program to ensure that the original intent of the program does not become circumvented. Issues not addressed these rules, will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis. Questions should be put in writing and mailed or faxed a minimum of 21 days prior to the next scheduled NAERIC Advantage® Advisory Committee meeting. The Advisory Committee meets on a quarterly basis. The Advisory Committee makes recommendations to the NAERIC Board of Directors. The NAERIC Board of Directors, at their next regularly scheduled board meeting, will make final approval of program rules.
- 2) NAERIC reserves the right to alter the conditions of all or part of the NAERIC Advantage® as it, in its sole discretion, determines to ensure fairness and equality to all participants.
- 3) The NAERIC Board of Directors shall decide all disputes arising out of the application or interpretation of any rules or conditions of the NAERIC Advantage®.
- 4) An entrant is ineligible to participate in the NAERIC Advantage® when prohibited by law because of legal residence, situs of approved event, or any other basis, and all or the prohibited portion of earned points or purse money will not be eligible for matching payouts.
- 5) All correspondence may be based upon postmarked, e-mail or facsimile transmission date.
- 6) Fraudulent practices may serve as a basis to terminate NAERIC and local association memberships.
- 7) Documentation of fraudulent practices will be referred to Pfizer.
- 8) Fraudulent practices may serve as a basis to terminate NAERIC and Local Association memberships.
- 9) Suspension of the right to register horses with NAERIC will be instituted for violation of NAERIC Advantage® rules.
- 10) Ranchers forfeit the right to register horses with NAERIC on the date their contract is terminated or the last shipping date of the contract.
- 11) A listing of all horses registered with NAERIC will appear on NAERIC's web site, www.naeric.org.

#### **HORSE APPROVAL**

- 1) January 1 serves as the official birthday of horses.
- 2) Horses foaled prior to 1995 are ineligible.
- 3) Foals of 1995, 1996 and 1997, registered with a breed registry, whose breeder of record (owner of mare at time of service) could be verified as: 1) a member of NAERIC and their local association at the time of nomination, and; 2) a member of NAERIC and their local association in the year the foal was conceived and foaled, were eligible for the program under "grandfather" status. In order to qualify under grandfather status eligibility, registration with NAERIC had to be completed by December 31, 1998.
- 4) Non-registered foals of 1995, 1996 and 1997 were considered on a case-by-case basis under grandfather status until December 31, 1998.
- 5) "Grandfathered" horses registered with a breed registry and owned by a NAERIC member at the time of registration with NAERIC did not need to be electronically identified. "Grandfathered" horses owned by non-NAERIC members were required to be electronically identified.

- 6) A foal, registered with a breed registry, whose owner of the dam at time of service (breeder of record) can be verified as: 1) a current member of NAERIC and their local association, and; 2) a member of NAERIC and their local association in the year the foal was conceived and foaled, is eligible for the program until April 30 of the it's yearling year.
- 7) Member ranchers, applying for registration with NAERIC for non-registered foals, must be the owner of the foal's dam at the time of conception, foaling and application to NAERIC.
- 8) Horses not registered with a breed registry must be electronically identified.
- 9) Each horse must complete all requirements of the NAERIC registration process by deadline dates to be enrolled in the NAERIC Advantage®. Required elements are:
- a) A completed Application for Registration for the current year.
- b) A copy of the horse's registration papers if the horse is registered with a recognized breed registry.
- c) The implantation of an approved microchip by the rancher (breeder) if the horse is not registered with a recognized breed registry.
- d) Payment of fees due including any outstanding fees from previous years.
- 10) As of January 1, 1999, applications for foals of 1999 and later must be made to the Incentive Program prior to:
- a) Eligibility for payout in any NAERIC-approved event
- b) Transfer of ownership (Transfer of ownership occurs when the check clears the bank. NAERIC Applications for horses sold must be entered online at www.naeric.org no later than the 1st business day after the sale.)
- c) Permanently leaving the ranch

In no case will a NAERIC Advantage® application be accepted after April 30 of an eligible horse's yearling year. After an application for a horse is submitted to NAERIC, the horse must be paid for. Neither credits nor refunds will be issued.

11) Offspring of leased mares will not be eligible for the NAERIC Advantage®.

#### **EVENT APPROVAL**

- 1) Events limiting participation to a certain group, where membership to that group is closed, will not be eligible for payouts.
- 2) Application materials for events to be considered for any year must be submitted electronically via the NAERIC web site 30 prior to the event. All approved events, for any given year, will be posted to www.naeric.org as soon as possible after approval.



#### RANCH APPROVAL

- 1) Beginning on June 1, 1998, and each successive June 1, only ranchers that are NAERIC and local association members, and have a contract with Pfizer Organics can register horses with NAERIC.
- 2) A contract holder's immediate family, including his/her spouse and children will be eligible to nominate horses if they "materially participate" (according to IRS regulations) in the management of the ranch.
- 3) In the case of partnerships, all parties must meet the eligibility requirements set forth under the Ranch Approval Process in order to nominate horses.

#### **PAYOUTS**

- 1) Starting year for NAERIC Advantage® approved events was 2006. NAERIC registered horses competing at approved events are eligible for payouts after payout applications are electronically submitted to NAERIC via the NAERIC web site, www.naeric.org and required documentation is received at the NAERIC office.
- 2) In order to qualify for payouts, approved horses and events must meet all eligibility requirements established by the governing body, which oversees the event. Payouts will be made in Canadian dollars (CD) if the original purse was in CD. Payouts will be made in United States dollars (USD) if the original purse was in USD.
- 3) Payouts made, to teams of horses, will be prorated based upon the number of approved horses comprising the team. For example, a six-horse hitch that earns a \$1,000 purse and is comprised of three approved horses, will receive a NAERIC Advantage® payout in the amount of \$500 (3/6 or 50% of the \$1,000 purse).
- 4) For a NAERIC horse used multiple times in one class at an event, NAERIC will match only the highest payout.
- 5) Payouts will be made according to the details listed for each event on the NAERIC site. No payouts will be made for qualifying rounds, showmanship, bareback riding, lead line and equitation or horsemanship type classes. The NAERIC Advantage® Advisory Committee and NAERIC Board of Directors will make final decisions regarding placing payouts, at individual events.
- 6) NAERIC Advantage® payouts will be made based upon, but not be limited to, official show results confirming horses' participation, placings and a copy of the purse check from the approved event.
- 7) The NAERIC horse must be identified in the show results with the horse's name as it appears on the breed registry papers and on the NAERIC certificate. A grade horse should be identified in show results with the name as it appears on the NAERIC certificate.
- 8) Payouts will be issued beginning February 1of the year following the previous year's approved events.
